Wu-hoo! After you've made the resumé, written the cover letter, and approached several businesses, you finally get a call back to go to the business for an interview. You're a step closer to getting a job. But the job offer doesn't exist if you can't get through an interview. You might look great on paper, but employers want to know what the real person is like. Preparation is the key to a good interview. If you know what to expect, you'll feel more confident and able to answer the questions. How you present yourself in the interview can determine whether or not you get the job.

- 7) What kind of people do you find the most difficult to work with?
- 8) What do you consider to be your personal strengths? Personal weaknesses?
- 9) What is important to you in a job? Why?
- 10) What kind of things would you like to avoid in a job? Why?
- 11) Why are you interested in this position?
- 12) In what areas do you feel you could improve your abilities?
- 13) What are some of the things that motivate you?
- 14) What do you feel most confident about doing?
- 15) What kind of student are you?
- 16) Which courses did you like the least? Why?
- 17) How do you spend your spare time? What are your hobbies?
- 18) Why did you choose this particular field of work?
- 19) Your application indicates that you were fairly involved in school (community) activities. Could you tell me what your responsibilities involved?
- 20) How did you spend your vacations while in school?
- 21) How well do you take criticism?
- 22) Do you learn things quickly?
- 23) Do you like regular hours?
- 24) Do you like routine work?
- 25) What job in our company would you choose if you were free to do so?

HOW TO FAIL AN INTERVIEW

There are many things that you can do to prepare for a successful interview. All employers expect an honest presentation of who you are, but a little polish never hurt anyone. The following are things employers say that you should <u>NEVER</u> do in an interview no matter what the job is or how the employers conducts him / herself.

Mumbling, muttering, not using your big kid voice. Avoiding eye contact.

Emphasizing how much you need the job for money alone.

Bringing a friend or relative with you, especially a child.

Interrupting the interviewer.

Indicating that you are restless or bored by moving about in your chair, twitching, tapping, rocking back on your chair, or having distracting bodily movements.

Criticizing former employers or co-workers.

Ignoring or not understanding social cues.

Giving false answers, lying, or contradicting your resume or application.

Giving excuses for poor past performance.

Being negative or critical about any subject.

Complaining about how much school sucks, so you want a job that doesn't suck.

Arrogance, being too good for this menial job, a snotty attitude.

Telling jokes, especially ones that are off-colour, rude, or inappropriate.

Answering your cell phone or texting someone during the interview.

Swearing, using slang, making fun of others.

Giving a sloppy, weak handshake or avoiding the handshake.

Using poor posture while sitting or standing, slouching or putting your feet up.

Smoking during or right before the interview (we can smell it).

Eating candy, chewing gum, or having poor habits if food is offered.

Wearing sunglasses, hats, or other non-professional gear (including ipods).

Picking your nose and eating it. (seriously)

Poor hygiene, smelly body odor, unkempt hair, sloppy clothes.
